Participants engaged in expert-led conferences and a diverse array of workshops, enjoyed cultural enrichment, and forged valuable professional connections. Noteworthy experiences included a cultural tour of the Milarca Museum, an icebreaker dinner that fostered new relationships, and a gala dinner honoring global achievements. Workshops covered topics such as Service Leadership in DKG, Early Childhood for Quality Education in Latin America: Guiding a More Equitable Future, Closing the Digital Gap in Latin America, Top Ten in Technology, and the use of Lego® Serious Play to enhance critical thinking.

A key highlight of the Forum was its partnership with the XVIII Encuentro Mundial de Valores (World Meeting of Values), themed "Caminos de Paz y Compasión" (Paths of Peace and Compassion). The World Meeting of Values championed universal ideals of compassion, peace, and social harmony. Coordinated by the Encuentro Mundial de Valores and supported by the Secretariat of Equality and Inclusion, the event united leaders, scholars, and practitioners from across the globe to deepen the dialogue on building a more compassionate society.

Dr. Beverly Hall-Maughan served as a panelist, representing DKG in high-level discussions on peace, compassion, and leadership. Her presence reinforced the Society's enduring commitment to educational leadership and the expansion of global partnerships. She shared the panel with Dr. Fernando Reimers, Professor of Practice in International Education at Harvard University, and Sofialeticia Morales, Secretary of Education for Nuevo Leon, further elevating the program's prestige.

The involvement of Tennessee members in both the Latin American Forum Conference and the World Meeting of Values underscores DKG's unwavering dedication to advancing education, promoting universal values, and empowering women educators in their leadership journeys worldwide by impacting education worldwide.

GIRLS Initiative

Since 1997, Delta Kappa Gamma (DKG) has partnered with UNICEF USA to expand educational opportunities for children across the globe. This long-standing collaboration has focused especially on reaching the most vulnerable populations, with an emphasis on girls' education and literacy.

For more than a decade, DKG supported UNICEF's Schools for Africa program, raising over \$600,000 to provide education to children in 21 priority countries. In addition, DKG contributed over \$200,000 to education and literacy programs in Central America, The Gambia, and Afghanistan, where UNICEF worked to ensure children—especially girls—had access to learning opportunities in some of the most challenging environments.

Today, DKG is continuing its impact through support of UNICEF's Girls Initiative to Revitalize Learning and Success (GIRLS) Fund. Launched in response to the setbacks caused by COVID-19, this fund is dedicated to bolstering girls' education in Africa. By providing flexible resources, the GIRLS Fund helps remove the barriers that keep girls out of school and strengthens global expertise to improve learning outcomes.

The GIRLS Fund focuses on secondary education, equipping girls not only to

complete their schooling but also to acquire life skills, overcome harmful social norms, and prepare for brighter futures. In addition to classroom learning, the initiative ensures schools provide supportive environments by addressing girls' health and nutrition needs—an essential component of academic success.

Through this effort, UNICEF and DKG are working to:

- I) Understand and overcome barriers preventing girls from accessing education.
- 2) Address harmful social norms that hold girls back.
- 3) Use technology to accelerate educational results.
- 4) Drive global advocacy and leadership through a Global Platform.
- 5) Establish a Technical Advisory Panel (TAP) to bring together experts on gender equality and women's empowerment. (www.dkg.org)

Together, these strategies aim to change the trajectory of learning and earning outcomes for girls and young women across Africa. The work of DKG and UNICEF demonstrates the transformative power of education: when girls are given the chance to learn, they thrive—and their communities thrive with them. "Together, we can ensure the next generation enjoys greater opportunities and a better life than the last." (www.dkg.org)


Jimmie Faye also chaired the Retired Teachers scholarship committee with dedication and care. Her love for students and for learning was the hallmark of her life.


