Next Set of Membership Moments are from Dr. Dorrie Powell, Beta Sigma

When you have been a member for as long as I have – this is my 40^{th} year – there are countless membership moments. It is so difficult to share only a few.

Before I was invited to membership, I knew nothing about DKG. I taught with several members at Bolivar Central High School but never had any of them tell me about DKG or suggest I might join. After teaching at this school for three years, I received a phone call that summer from a local retired educator who asked me several specific questions about my teaching experience, education, community activities, and such. I later learned that these were questions on the membership recommendation form and that three years' experience was, at that time, the minimum requirement for membership. I am so glad that DKG is no longer such a secret society. I am also glad that DKG is now open to developing through membership the potential in beginning and preservice teachers. I am glad that retired educators can join even if they did not feel the need or find the time to join when they were actively employed. I am especially glad that I received that invitation to membership and joined Beta Sigma Chapter and DKG in 1983.

My first trip to state convention came in 1990 when I was incoming chapter president. Chapter mentors made sure that I had a seasoned convention attendee to guide me through every event and responsibility. Her name was Tennie Zue Armour. She will always hold a special place in my heart. I applaud every member who attends convention whether alone or with chapter members, but it was certainly much easier for me to have someone show me the ropes. Thank you, Miss Tennie Zue.

When I worked on my doctorate from 1995-1998, I had to take summer classes and was lucky to attend even part of the state convention. During that time, several chapter members liked to rent a cabin at the Smokehouse and relax for a day or two before the convention began. Always supportive and considerate, these members told me there would be a place for me to sleep whenever I could make it to Sewanee. One year, we must have been given a cabin that was originally built for a different purpose than to house a group of school teacher DKG members. Perhaps it had been designed as a honeymoon suite because, despite multiple beds and sofas for sleeping, the only bathtub was a very large one in the middle of the cabin – and there was no shower at all. By the time I arrived, my chapter members had contrived a privacy curtain of blankets suspended from the ceiling to enclose that huge tub. After that, we made a point to ask not only how many could sleep in the cabin but exactly where they might have to bathe.

Beverly Smith and I became fast friends about 20 years ago outside the Tennessee Breakfast. Somehow, we had two more members and guests show up for the breakfast than the hotel could accommodate in the small banquet room. Beverly and I volunteered to give up our seats, expecting we would also give up our meal as well. Instead, the hotel staff served us at a table in the hallway where we missed most of the program that was going on inside but entertained ourselves by talking nonstop at the "children's table" outside the Tennessee Breakfast.

One year at the state convention, my chapter was assigned rooms in Humphreys dorm. We checked in early at registration since a couple of us needed to attend flag bearer practice on Thursday afternoon. Before dinner, we headed to the dorm for the first time and tried to locate our room - L4. We searched every floor looking for our assigned room but without luck. No one we asked seemed to know the location of L4, including the members working at the registration desk. We needed to change clothes for the flag ceremony but had no available dorm room. In desperation, we took turns in the ladies' room off the first-floor lobby. After the general session, we still struggled to find anyone who knew the location of L4 and thought we might end up sleeping in the dorm lobby as well. Finally, someone on the university staff had the answer. L4 was a loft that had to be accessed from a room on the floor below. The bathroom for the loft was also located in the room below. While that kind of arrangement might work for college students, we suggested they not use those L rooms in future for our DKG members.

Years ago, I served on the state membership committee and was helping with the first-timers tea at the state convention. Part of the program was a presentation on the opportunities and benefits of DKG membership, including the International Leadership Development Seminar (at that time called the Golden Gift Seminar). When the program concluded, Dr. Jensi Souders walked over to me and told me that I should apply. I did apply and, to my amazement, was accepted. If Jensi had not encouraged me, I am not sure I would have had the self-confidence to apply on my own. One of the special benefits of my membership in DKG has been having others recognize my potential and encouraging me to embrace opportunities.

After attending the Leadership Development Seminar in Austin in 2002, I knew I needed to step up to leadership opportunities in our state organization. I applied for the position of state corresponding secretary. To my horror, the nominations committee asked me to serve as recording secretary, the one job I never wished to hold. As I hesitated to respond, they offered me a spot on the nominations committee instead. Two years later, it was my responsibility as a member of the nominations committee to persuade Beverly Smith to take the job of recording secretary. When I was asked a second time to take the job of recording secretary, my own words to Beverly echoed in my head. I took a deep breath and accepted the one office in DKG that I had thought I would never hold!

When I served as TNSO second vice-president, I chaired the convention steering committee for our 75th anniversary convention in 2010. Obviously, this convention was special. We had an anniversary music CD, a commemorative book, a special skit, extra pieces to the program, and special guests. We also had over 400 register to attend. That meant more dorm rooms to assign, some in dorms we had not used in recent years, and extra tables and seats to squeeze in at meal events. I needed help, especially after my husband had a heart attack in May and required bypass surgery. My steering committee did a wonderful job. Dee Dee Rives was president but found time to assign table numbers for the meal events. Members from some of the Memphis chapters helped my own chapter members as we stuffed convention bags with meal tickets, name badges, and handouts. I thought I was finally organized and prepared for the convention until soon after registration opened on Thursday at the old Sewanee Inn. As the rest of the steering committee prepared to hand out registration packets and room keys, I rushed to set up signs to identify important locations on campus. After removing the first sign to post outside registration, I slammed my trunk to race to the next location. Unfortunately, my purse and keys were inside the trunk. After my initial panic and with the help of my steering committee members, I contacted

campus security and my vehicle's OnStar service. Eventually, I was able to unlock my car, retrieve my keys, and post the rest of my signs. It was an inauspicious start to a most memorable convention.

I had the honor of serving as state president for the 2015-2017 biennium. As I stood in line to pick up my 2015 convention registration, I felt a tap on my shoulder and heard a familiar voice. Nita Scott, former teaching friend and member of my chapter, had come from Austin to share in my installation as state president. Nita had plotted with several Tennessee members to surprise me with her visit to the convention. Having Nita present along with my husband, family members, and chapter members made my installation truly special.

I have never been so proud of my DKG membership as I was when Tennessee hosted the 2016 International Convention in Nashville. I was state president at that time, but I deserve none of the credit for the fabulous success of the convention. That credit goes to the extraordinary Convention Steering Committee chaired by Becky Sadowski and the hundreds of chapter volunteers who worked in advance of and during the convention.

It has been a delight to communicate with my DKG sisters 6 times a year and has been very satisfying to receive a Highest Honors award each year. While writing the grant for Xi State, I decided that I should send one to the International too. Reading is my passion with my students. I was at an at-risk school where reading scores were very low. I used the Accelerated Reader program, so I built a grant proposal around it to improve the reading abilities of my students. The theme of the proposal was "Practice Makes Perfect". My principal signed off on everything I included with even a 30-minute silent reading time each morning. I don't think she thought we would get the grant.

In early April, I came home from school and stopped to pick up the mail. There was a letter with DKG in the mailbox. I tore it open and screamed "I got it". I got \$1,500 from Xi State so I could get the café tables. Yea!! By that time, I had calmed down, so I read the letter again. My eyes got very big. Again, the Librarian had read incorrectly! The letter was from the International Educational Foundation.

The letter informed me that they were pleased to award my grant proposal request. I would be receiving \$15,000 to carry out my plan to increase student reading abilities for the coming year. And, we did just that! The first semester we had an increase of 60% schoolwide. The second semester produced another 54% increase. One special education classroom went up 91%. We could not have managed this success without the plan that the grant allowed us to utilize. Our students benefitted greatly from DKG's monetary involvement in our school.
