Xi State History 2015-2017 Biennium Prepared by Dorrie J. Powell, Ed.D.

2015-2016

Dr. Dorrie Powell, Beta Sigma Chapter, took over the leadership of Xi State in July 2015 from Beverly Smith, Alpha Xi Chapter. Like Beverly, Dorrie worked fulltime while serving as state president. Since 1980, Dorrie had worked for Hardeman County Schools in West Tennessee as a classroom teacher of English and journalism at Bolivar Central High School, next as school librarian at the same high school, and then as GEAR UP college access coordinator for the two high schools in Hardeman County. This GEAR UP job is the one she held during her term as state organization president. She and her husband Wilson lived on farmland that had been in his family since 1830. Following a house fire in 1986, Wilson built their home "from the stump" using timber milled from trees cut on family property.

2015 Xi State Convention

Dorrie was installed as state president during the 80th Xi State Convention, held June 4-6, 2015, on the campus of the University of the South at Sewanee, with 282 members registered. Other officers installed during the convention included:

The Society Representative for the convention was International Member-at-Large Barb Whiting from Minnesota. Dorrie's close friend Nita Scott - DKG Membership Services Administrator, former teaching colleague, and former member of Dorrie's chapter - surprised Dorrie by attending the convention at her own expense to see her installed as state president. Dorrie was also delighted to have her husband Wilson and several family members attend both the Friday evening banquet and Saturday morning brunch. During the Birthday Brunch on Saturday morning, Dorrie accepted the gavel from Beverly Smith and announced her theme for the biennium, "Xi State – Growing Possibilities," with these remarks:

Under Beverly's superb leadership, we have focused on the Real Common Corewith the C in this case, standing for "Cultivating." That resonates with me as a farmer's daughter and wife. I know firsthand the hard work required for cultivation, the need for proper tools and equipment, the unforeseen vagaries of weather and happenstance that

can sabotage the very best plans, the ongoing cultivation process that seems sometimes slow to show results. I also know that, in agricultural terms, we have to cultivate to create a favorable growing environment so that whatever we are trying to grow can reach maximum potential. And I also recognize that I will be doing a great deal of growing over the next two years as I serve as your Xi State president. It is with just such a growing environment in mind that I have chosen my theme for the coming biennium — "Xi State . . . Growing Possibilities."

This phrase very possibly suggests different things to each of you. Frankly, that is one of the reasons I chose it. I want this biennium to be one of growth on as many levels and in as many directions as possible. I want the next two years to be a period in which our members grow as educators and individuals, one in which we "grow" more early career educators into seasoned career professionals, one in which we "grow" more members for our existing chapters or even "grow" a new chapter or two in parts of this state where we no longer have membership.

I want our chapters to grow more leaders to assume key positions at the chapter and state levels – and possibly beyond. I want us to "grow" more adept with technology, more invested in the legislative process, more aware of global concerns, more efficient and effective in our transaction of chapter and state business, more supportive of our colleagues and fellow members, and more visible and vocal in our communities.

For the next two years, I invite each of you and all Xi State members to explore and embrace "Xi State . . . Growing Possibilities."

2015 Southeast Regional Conference

The 2015 Southeast Regional Conference was held in Savannah, GA, July 15-18, at the Savannah Harbor Conference Center and adjacent Westin Savannah Harbor. Under the leadership of International President Dr. Lyn Schmid (2014-2016), the theme for this conference and the entire biennium was "85 Years and Beyond: Advancing Key Women Educators for Life." During the preconference Leadership Development (July 13-15), Dorrie and the other 2015-2017 Southeast state presidents received their training. A total of 63 Xi State members attended the conference in support of Southeast Regional Director Becky Sadowski (Alpha Lambda).

Xi State members played key roles throughout the conference. Chapter Visits

Dorrie began her official visits to Xi State's 76 chapters with a relatively short drive to Gibson County on August 20 to help Tau Chapter celebrate 50 year member Annie Laurie James on the occasion of her 100th birthday. Soon, however, she began to crisscross the state for chapter visits and was grateful when chapters met jointly or made meeting adjustments to accommodate her work schedule. In total, she visited with members of 38 chapters the first year.

Leadership Conference for State Committee Planning

Members of Xi State's 17 appointed and three elected committees met at Whitworth-Buchanan Middle School in Murfreesboro on September 25-26, 2015, for the biennial committee planning conference. State recording secretary Dr. Beverly Hall (Alpha Rho) served as registrar for the 113 members attending the conference. The planning conference began Friday evening when committee chairs, area directors, state officers, and related personnel received their charges for the biennium and participated in a brief synectics activity to encourage synergy and coordination of effort among committees. On Saturday, Dorrie asked all committees to look for Growing Possibilities in their work for the biennium with four key words in mind: Propagate, Pollinate, Plant, and Prune.

State Convention Planning Meeting

On January 17-18, 2016, Dorrie, 1st Vice President Sherrie Collins, and 2nd Vice President Dr. Linda Eller traveled to Sewanee to make plans for the upcoming state convention in June. In keeping with recent practices, Dorrie and her vice presidents worked out convention needs and preferences on Sunday night before meeting with Chris Carlson and other key personnel at the University of the South the following morning. Together, they finalized plans for the 2016 state convention in June.

Legislative Symposium

The first Xi State Legislative Symposium of the biennium was held January 26-27, 2016, at the Millennium Maxwell House Hotel in Nashville. Members met on Monday evening for a Q & A session with legislative panelists. On Tuesday morning, members met for a brief breakfast program before adjourning for a day on the Hill to meet with their legislators or attend legislative committee meetings. Despite good weather for January, attendance was reduced from previous years.

Beginning Leadership Management Seminars

The first Leadership Management Seminar for the biennium was held April 1-2, 2016, at St. Columba's Episcopal Retreat near Memphis. Dr. Beverly Helms, Past International President (2012-2014), led 16 participants in understanding their own personality type and those of others, using parliamentary procedure, and finding one's place in DKG. The second Leadership Management Seminar was held September 30 – October 1, 2016, at Henry Horton State Park,

with Dr. Helms again leading 18 attendees in a discovery of their own personality preferences and other important leadership skills.

Chapter Leadership Training 2016

Chapters were encouraged to send a "Grow Team," made up of officers elected for the 2016-2018 biennium and other chapter representatives, to one of three Chapter Leadership Training sessions - April 9 in Knoxville (approximately 62 registered), April 23 in Murfreesboro (approximately 80 registered), or April 30 in Jackson (approximately 60 registered). Xi State Recording Secretary Dr. Beverly Hall (Alpha Rho) served as registrar for the three events. Chapters were encouraged to attend sessions for chapter presidents, treasurers, editors, and webmasters. Xi State committees also offered sessions on membership, strategic planning, communications and publicity, and educational excellence. Chapters were also invited to share chapter successes and concerns, which were compiled and distributed to chapters. Participants at each location also viewed a webinar by Nita Scott, DKG Membership Services Administrator, entitled "TN: The Power of Positive Change," which discussed declining membership as well as possible causes and solutions.

Xi State Convention 2016

The 81st Xi State Convention was held June 2-4, 2016, at the University of the South at Sewanee with Nita Scott, Membership Services Administrator, serving as Society representative and approximately 300 members in attendance, including 32 first-timers. This state convention, taking place only a month prior to the 2016 International Convention in Nashville, provided the perfect opportunity to disseminate information and train volunteers for many of the roles members would be filling during the Nashville convention. Inspirational messages

— "Moments of Possibility" — were scattered throughout the convention program, and first-time attendees were treated to a bus tour of campus lead by Dee Dee Rives, past state president (2009-2011), who shared campus lore and convention logistics.

Guerry Hall was the center of convention business with registration for the entire convention set up in the lobby and the executive board meeting and both general sessions held in Guerry Auditorium. During Thursday evening's moving Order of the Rose Ceremony, the Awards Committee recognized the faithful service of nine extraordinary members. A successful Silent Auction raised more than \$4,000.00 for leadership development, and chapters showcased their "Growing Possibilities" in beautiful displays.

With no proposed amendments to consider, business sessions ran smoothly. However, there were some items of note during the various business sessions. During the executive board meeting, two previous votes were read into the minutes endorsing Becky Sadowski for the offices of International First and Second Vice President. Finance Committee chair Marge Loftstrom presented a revised biennial budget reflecting reduced projected revenue and a declining trend in membership, and Dorrie filled a vacancy on the Finance Committee following a resignation.

Immediately following the Executive Board meeting, the board caucused about the upcoming International election to be held during the 2016 convention in Nashville where there were two candidates for the positions of International First Vice President, Southeast Regional Director, Member-at-Large, and European Representative to the Nominations Committee.

Friday morning, the Village Trail was dedicated in honor of Liz Whorley Bradley, past state president (1981-1983), who was on hand for the ribbon cutting. This walking trail was then traveled as part of the Breast Cancer Awareness Walk, sponsored by Alpha Rho. Past state presidents then joined Dorrie on the balcony of McClurg Dining Hall for the Iris Circle Breakfast.

Friday's and Saturday's convention meal events were held in Upper Cravens. During the Awards Luncheon, chapters and individuals were recognized in a variety of categories. At least 23 chapters received Gold recognition on the Maycie Chapter Excellence Award, and Susan Young (Beta Beta) and Cheryl McHone (Gamma) were also recognized as recipients of International scholarships. Members with 50 or more years of membership were honored, including Dr. Alicia Tilley (Alpha Lambda), with 74 years of membership in DKG.

During the Presidents Banquet, incoming and outgoing chapter presidents were presented, the chorus under the direction of Julie Hughes (Alpha Xi) and accompanied by Janice Enck (Alpha Lambda) performed a beautiful medley, Nita Scott continued her International Update, and Bea Lyons (Gamma Lambda) was awarded the Xi State Achievement Award.

Early on Saturday morning, the Vision Foundation held its annual coffee on the balcony of McClurg Dining Hall. Next, members assembled for the beautiful Ceremony of Remembrance at All Saints' Chapel, followed by the Birthday Brunch, where Dr. Kathie Harned (Beta Upsilon) presented "Remembering Maycie" in recognition of Founders' Day. Dorrie was again delighted to have her husband Wilson and other family members attend both the banquet and the brunch. The convention ended with the singing of "The Delta Kappa Gamma Song."

2016-2017

International Convention 2016

On July 5-9, Tennessee welcomed the DKG world to the Nashville Opryland Resort and Convention Center for the 2016 International Convention. A total of 2056 members, non-members, and guests registered for the convention, including 268 Tennessee members as Dr. Lyn Schmid, International President (2014-2016), continued her theme: "85 Years and Beyond: Advancing Key Women Educators for Life."

Becky Sadowski (Alpha Lambda) chaired the convention steering committee, which also included Beverly Smith (Alpha Xi), Nancy Davis (Gamma Mu), Dr. Jensi Souders (Alpha Phi), Marsha Brewer (Beta Upsilon), Dr. Elaine Alexander (Beta Epsilon), Carol Moling (Beta Gamma), Elaine Warwick (Rho), Dr. Kathie Harned (Beta Upsilon), Orlean Bauman (Alpha Rho), Camille Dolan (Alpha Lambda), Betty Only (Alpha Sigma), Susan Hoback (Alpha Lambda), and Dr. Dorrie Powell (Beta Sigma). More than 300 Tennessee members volunteered in some capacity in advance of or during the convention. Convention keynote speakers included Kai Knight, violinist and composer; Mike Figliuolo, author of *One Piece of Paper*; Judith Viorst, author of books for both children and adults; and Anna Maria Chavez, CEO of Girl Scouts USA. The Educational Foundation hosted a very successful fundraiser event – "Call Me Country" – at the Wildhorse Saloon in downtown Nashville. With so many Xi State members involved in the business of the convention, the Tennessee state event, organized by Corresponding Secretary Michelle Steen (Theta) was a low-key beverage affair – "Tea Time in Tennessee" - immediately following Tennessee Night.

Tennessee's Star of the Southeast, announced at the Southeast Regional Breakfast, was Marsha Brewer (Beta Upsilon). Cathy Daugherty (Virginia) received the Achievement Award, and Carolyn Pittman (Arkansas) was elected International President 2016-2018. Others elected included Barbara Whiting (Minnesota) as First Vice President, Becky Sadowski (Tennessee) as Second Vice President, June Bowers (Nebraska) as Member-at-Large 2016-2020, Bjorg Nakling (Norway) as Europe Regional Director, Carol Hughes (Illinois) as Northeast Regional Director, Dr. Rhonda Anderson (South Dakota) as Northwest Regional Director, Linda Navorska (South Carolina) as Southeast Regional Director, Patricia Park (Hawaii) as Southwest Regional Director, Joan Wolfe (Ontario) as Area Representative for Canada, and Flor M. Perez (Costa Rica) as Area Representative for Latin America. Dr. Beverly Hall (Alpha Rho) was elected to the International Finance Committee 2016-2020.

Death of Dr. Paxton

Members of Xi State were saddened to learn that Dr.Willene Paxton, Xi State President, 1989-1991, died July 23, 2016, while traveling in England.

Creative Arts Retreat

On September 23-24, 2016, the 2016 Creative Arts Retreat took place at the historic Donoho Hotel in Red Boiling Springs. Approximately 80 members gathered to enjoy great food, historic attractions, and beautiful scenery. Workshops included both arts and crafts as well as songwriting, line dancing, and guitar.

State Convention Planning Meeting

On January, 15-16, 2017, Dorrie, 1st Vice President Sherrie Collins and 2nd Vice President Dr. Linda Eller again travelled to Sewanee to make plans with the University of the South for the June 1-3 state convention. Because of a convention budget shortfall the previous year, Dorrie and her team decided to eliminate the registration package pricing and use an itemized registration form instead. The newly renovated Quintard dorm was again offered for on-campus housing, and, for the first time, attendees staying on campus could request a single room with a small upcharge.

Legislative Symposium 2017

On February 13-14, 2017, state members again converged on Nashville for the Legislative Symposium, held at the Millennium Maxwell House Hotel. Following Monday night's legislative panel discussion, members met the following morning for remarks by Dr. Candice McQueen, Tennessee Commissioner of Education. Members then took advantage of the hotel's shuttle to visit individual legislators or attend legislative committee meetings.

Advanced Leadership Management Seminar

Eighteen graduates of the Beginning Leadership Management Seminar attended the advanced version at Montgomery Bell State Park on March 31-April 1, 2017. The presenter for the advance seminar was Tennessee's own Becky Sadowski (Alpha Lambda), who based her training on Mike Figliuolo's book, *One Piece of Paper*.

Chapter Visits - Year 2

Dorrie visited 40 chapters during the second year of the biennium for a total of 78 chapters during her term as president. With her fulltime work schedule, Dorrie was not always able to accept each chapter or area invitation. However, she appreciated every opportunity to meet with members and did her best to find another state leader to visit in her stead when she could not personally attend. Dorrie especially appreciated invitations to regional, area, and joint chapter meetings. Her final chapter visits were anything but close to home. They came in late June 2017 as she was joined by immediate past state president Beverly Smith and incoming state president Dr. Elaine Alexander for a road-trip to visit Alpha Theta in Harrogate and Gamma Mu in Mountain City.

State Convention 2017

The 82nd Xi State Convention was held June 1-3, 2017, at the University of the South at Sewanee with 259 registered to attend. Society representative for the convention was June Bowers (Nebraska), International Member-at-Large, 2016-2020, with Becky Sadowski (Alpha Lambda) serving as her escort. Julie Hughes (Alpha Xi) and Janice Enck (Alpha Lambda) again provided music throughout the convention, and inspirational messages – "Moments of Possibility" – were scattered throughout the convention program.

Convention program books were slimmer than usual as Dorrie and her officer team tried to trim the convention budget as much as feasible. To that end, officer and committee reports were posted on the state website instead of printed in the convention booklet. Also, the Birthday Brunch was moved to McClurg to reduce catering costs as well as to provide easier access for those tasked with decorating for the event. (When the brunch was held in Upper Cravens, the chapters in charge of decorations had to wait until well after the banquet on Friday night to set up their table decorations or gain entry early Saturday morning and hope they could finish in time.)

Business items during the Executive Board Meeting included reading into the minutes of two earlier executive board votes: the merger of Alpha Tau and Alpha Mu Chapters, and the approval of the 2017-2019 Strategic Plan. During the Second General Session, two proposed amendments to the state bylaws and seven proposed amendments to the state rules were approved, all resulting in minor changes in language or addition of clarifying details. The Nominations Committee presented a slate of officers and elected committees, all approved by acclamation.

The Orientation Tea was again held in Bishop's Commons for the 30 first-time convention attendees, including the incoming Kentucky state president. Past State President Dee Dee Rives (Theta) presided over the orientation and bus tour of campus.

Thursday night included a carillon concert between dinner and the First General Session where Society representative June Bowers delivered greetings from International. Following the general session, the Awards Committee presented a lovely Order of the Rose Ceremony honoring ten deserving recipients. The Silent Auction again raised crucial funds for leadership development, and the various state committees helped explain their key roles in the work of the state organization with informative and attractive displays.

On Friday, the past state presidents joined Dorrie and soon-to-be-elected state president Dr. Elaine Alexander in the McClurg Tower Room for the Iris Circle Breakfast. Friday also included three separate timeslots for breakout sessions in Gailor Hall on topics of professional and personal interest as well as sessions of benefit to chapters and members interested in applying for scholarships and grants.

During Friday's Awards Luncheon, 25 chapters received the Gold award on the Maycie Award for Chapter Excellence. Recipients were also recognized for Vision Foundation grants and scholarships, including Jamie Lawson, who received the Maycie K. Southall International Scholarship.

The Presidents Banquet on Friday evening included a lovely medley performed by the Xi State chorus. June Bowers, Society representative, delivered the keynote address, and Beverly Smith (Alpha Xi) was awarded the Xi State Achievement Award.

Then all members assembled in All Saints' Chapel for the Ceremony of Remembrance before adjourning to McClurg for the Birthday Brunch. Once again, Dorrie was delighted to have her husband Wilson and other family members share the banquet and brunch with her.

During the brunch, Dorrie reflected on her time as Xi State president and shared one final message as state president:

Through my monthly *Leadership Links*, the president's column in each issue of the *Xi State News*, and my remarks delivered at your chapter meetings, I have had numerous opportunities to get my "message" across to you, to plant some seeds that I hope will sprout and grow. Well, this is my last official opportunity to sow a few more seeds, so here they are:

I believe that the near future of DKG, of Xi State, and of your chapter and mine is sitting in this room, but our future is also sitting back home. Our future includes the members we need to encourage and enable to attend state and international events because we really never grasp what we are part of if we never venture beyond the chapter. Our future includes the teachers we need to invite to membership and to whom we need to offer our support, especially in their early years of the profession. Our future includes the college students – in decreasing numbers – who are choosing education as their profession. Our future even includes the students in our elementary and secondary classrooms, who are

watching us and, I hope, admiring us, as they consider who they want to be when they grow up.

Two years ago at this very brunch, I announced that "Xi State . . . Growing Possibilities" would be my theme for the biennium. That morning I enumerated several possible ways in which we might grow as individuals, as educators, and collectively as an organization, but the list was far from exhaustive. And I acknowledged that I would no doubt be the one who grew the most. I am happy to report today that my hopes and expectations for myself and for this state organization have been met and even exceeded. Xi State and I have encountered and embraced more growing possibilities than I could have envisioned. While my season as state president is done, the growing still needs to continue.

To paraphrase Darwin - As any organism grows, it changes. And each generation must learn to adapt to environmental changes, or the species does not survive. We have had a wonderful span of 88 years in which DKG has seen remarkable change. It stands to reason, then, that the next 88 will also require change – in how we identify and recruit our members, in how we provide to our members the benefits of this organization, and in how we impact education worldwide.

Dorrie then handed over the gavel to newly installed president, Dr. Elaine Alexander (Beta Epsilon) who shared her theme for the new biennium. The Founders' Day program "And Still She Persisted" was written by 1st Vice President Sherrie Collins (Beta Pi) and presented with the help of Xi State members representing each of the founders. The convention concluded with the singing of "The Delta Kappa Gamma Song."

Closing Comments

Serving as Xi State president was one of the greatest honors and challenges of my professional life. I was deeply humbled to represent our state organization during the 2016 International Convention in Nashville, where so many deserve credit for the convention's success. During my term as state president, I was gratified by the support and concern of members and chapters across the state as I balanced my duties at work and at home with my duties as state president.

One of the first lessons I learned as state president was that, just because I had the gavel and the title of president, I did not automatically have all the answers. I soon realized that I would need to rely on the same answer I often gave as a librarian when I was confronted with an unexpected or difficult situation or question: "I don't know the answer right now, but I will find out and let you know." Each challenge or unexpected question presented a new opportunity for growth. I certainly did not have all the answers (and still do not), but I had, and continue to have, access to incredible expertise – about DKG, about education, about life – thanks to my membership in this organization.

When I first attended Xi State Convention in 1990 as chapter president, I never dreamed that I would someday serve as president, but others saw potential in me. Members in my chapter and leaders at the state and international levels nurtured my potential and helped me grow. My chapter members supported me every step of the way, and my school system allowed me to take advantage of the leadership and service opportunities that DKG offers.

Finally, I could not have attempted to serve Xi State as president without the unconditional support of my husband Wilson and his family. He was always my biggest cheerleader and believed that I needed to pay back or pay forward the benefits that I had received from DKG. As usual, he was right. However, considering how much I have received from DKG, I am not sure I can ever balance those scales.
